Grade 3 Summer Reading

Choose at least one of the following from the Classic Starts series: Greek Myths (adapted by Diane Namm), Roman Myths (adapted by Diane Namm), The Odyssey (Homer/ adapted by Tania Zamorsky)

Keep a reading summary journal in a 1-subject notebook. Each time you read and/or after each story/chapter, write a summary of what happened (you may include your own illustrations if you'd like). In your writing, try to remember to form complete thoughts/sentences that include capitalization and punctuation. Your writing may be in either manuscript or cursive, but please do your best handwriting. Your summaries may include: setting, characters, events, problems, solutions, and possible predictions of what you believe may happen next in the story. Your journal may also include your evaluation (thoughts/opinions) about what you read. This journal will not only help review the story as you read, but also help in writing a report that will be assigned in the first weeks of school. *PLEASE NOTE - this is NOT the summer reading report, but completed for the purposes mentioned above. Please also include, at the end of your summary journal, any additional book titles & authors you read over the summer.

ALSO, PLEASE DON'T FORGET in your summer travels to review addition, subtraction, (beginning) multiplication, and (beginning) division basic facts. Here are some suggestions: tablet apps, computer games, math websites, "old school" flash cards (store bought or homemade), math workbooks, &/or oral reviews while traveling anywhere from Chick-Fil-A to the beach! Challenge yourself, but make it fun too :)

Grade 5 Summer Reading

This summer you have **two** required reading assignments to prepare for 5th grade:

Book Assignment #1:

You are required to read *The Magician's Nephew* by C.S. Lewis.

No written assignment for this book, however there will be a test on the book during the first week of school, so be sure you read it carefully and finish it before the first day of school!

Book Assignment #2:

Read a **nonfiction** book on a topic that interests you.

When you are finished reading, create a poster, which displays what you have learned. Be sure to include the title and author on your poster with pictures and text. You will present this to the class the first week of school. Please do NOT choose a biography for this report as we will be reading biographies in September.

TO GET AHEAD: * Begin to review the States and Capitals * Practice your basic math facts (add/subtract/multiply/divide). Try to find fun math-practice games online and test yourself frequently. Drill, drill, drill.....flash cards are the best way to practice. * Write often! Write letters to friends, keep a journal or a diary, write poems, or stories. * Go to museums, fairs, parks, gardens and/or visit historical sights. Just keep learning, but do not forget to have fun!

Middle School Summer Reading

Please read both of the books for your grade. There are no assignments to be completed before the first day of school, but there will be a test/discussion on both of the books the first week of school.

In addition to the summer reading, we are requiring that middle school students complete a free online typing course over the summer. To access the course, go to <https://www.typing.com/student>, sign up for a free account. All middle school students should complete the “Beginner” course. The course includes up to fourteen lessons, so please plan ahead and spread them out over the summer. After completing all the Beginner lessons, students should take the 1 minute typing test and have the printed certificate to turn in at the beginning of the school year. We feel that learning how to type is a critical skill that will benefit our students in middle school and throughout their further education.
